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Zielsetzung

Das Ziel des Einstufungstests ist, Sie möglichst genau einzustufen, damit Sie ein klares Bild von Ihren Vorkenntnissen erhalten und so den für Sie passenden Sprachkurs belegen können.

Wenn Sie zuvor schon einmal ein höheres Sprachniveau erreicht hatten, z.B. Englisch in der gymnasialen Oberstufe gelernt haben, sollten Sie lediglich die späteren Fragen (ab Frage 91) beantworten und die Teile 1 bis 6 weglassen. Ähnlich können Sie verfahren, wenn Sie die „Mittlere Reife“ in Englisch besitzen. Lassen Sie in diesem Fall die Testteile 1 bis 4 weg und beginnen Sie mit Teil 5 (Frage 61).

Auswertung

Wenn Sie mit dem Test fertig sind (oder keine weiteren Aufgaben lösen können), können Sie anhand des Lösungsschlüssels Ihre Antworten korrigieren. Vergleichen Sie dazu Ihre Antworten auf den Antwortbogen mit den Ausführungen im Lösungsschlüssel.

Fragen 121 bis 150 (9. & 10. Teil): **Network Connection**

Ergebnis 23 und höher: Sie verfügen über sehr gute Kenntnisse auf Niveau A2.2 und können mit **Network Plus** anfangen.

Weniger als 23 richtig: Sie sollten mit *Network Connection* beginnen, um fit für einen Kurs auf B1-Niveau zu werden.

Fragen 151 bis 180 (11. & 12. Teil): *Network Plus*

Ergebnis 23 und höher: Sie befinden sich bereits im oberen Bereich des Niveaus B1 und können mit *Network Certificate Skills* anfangen.

Weniger als 23 richtig: Sie sollten mit *Network Plus* beginnen, um fit für einen Kurs zum Abschließen des Niveaus B1 zu werden.

Fragen 181 bis 210 (13. & 14. Teil): *Network Certificate Skills*

Ergebnis 23 und höher: Sie haben das Niveau B1.2 abgeschlossen und können mit einem Kurs auf B2-Niveau beginnen (siehe dazu „Auswertung Spezialkurse“).

Weniger als 23 richtig: Sie sollten mit *Network Certificate Skills* beginnen, um das Niveau B1 abzuschließen.

Um abschließende Klarheit über Ihre genauen Vorkenntnisse zu erhalten, empfehlen wir nach jedem Test ein Beratungsgespräch mit Ihrem Kursanbieter. Im Grenzbereich (20 bis 23 richtig) und in Hinblick auf Refresher-Lerner kann nur ein Gespräch die nötigen Informationen liefern.

Auswertung Spezialkurse

Bei den Spezialkursen ist die Einstufung in hohem Maße von Ihrer Interessenlage und Ihrer Lernbiographie abhängig. Folgende Testergebnisse können als Anhaltspunkte dienen:

Network Tourist (Niveau A1/A2): Voraussetzung ist eine Einstufung in *Network 2*, eventuell auch etwas darunter.

Network Basic Conversation (Niveau A2/B1): Voraussetzung ist eine Einstufung in *Network 3*

Network Office (Fertigkeiten auf A2-Niveau vorausgesetzt): Voraussetzung ist eine Einstufung in *Network Connection* oder *Plus*.

Network Conversation (Niveau B2): Voraussetzung ist eine Einstufung in einen Kurs auf B2-Niveau, also 23 oder mehr richtige Antworten in den Teilen 13 und 14.

Auswertung Refresher

Wenn Sie zu der großen Gruppe der so genannten Auffrischer gehören, also zu einem früheren Zeitpunkt bessere Englischkenntnisse besessen haben als jetzt, wäre für Sie ein Refresher-Kurs am besten geeignet. In einem solchen Kurs werden Ihre sprachlichen Lücken gezielt wieder geschlossen.

Das Testergebnis eines Refresher-Lerners wird sich von dem eines Seiten-/Quereinsteigers beim Einstufungstest unterscheiden. Anhaltspunkte für einen Refresher-Lerner könnten sein:

- Unabhängig vom Schwierigkeitsgrad bewegt sich das Testergebnis in allen Teilen im Mittelfeld (17 bis 22 richtige Antworten).
- Es treten in höheren Testteilen weniger Fehler auf als in den niedrigen.
- Nicht oder falsch beantwortete Fragen finden sich nicht konzentriert, sondern breit gestreut in einem Fragenkomplex.

Gerade für Auffrischer ist das Beratungsgespräch von besonderer Wichtigkeit, da nur in einem ausführlichen Gespräch geklärt werden kann, welcher Kurs für Sie der geeignetste ist. Bitte kontaktieren Sie dazu Ihren Kursanbieter.
